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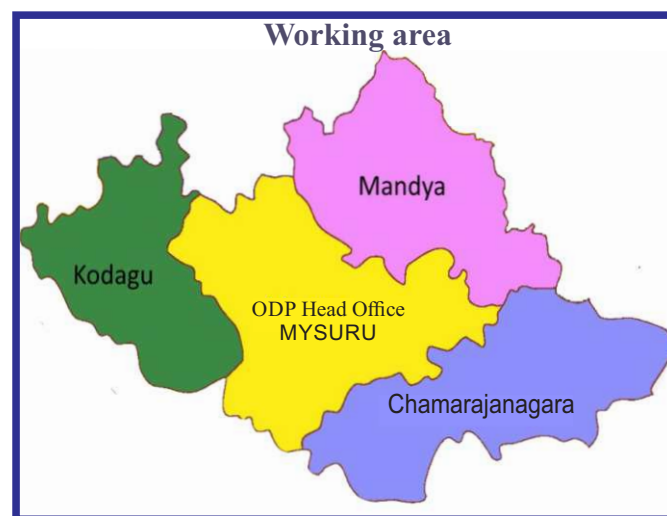
About us

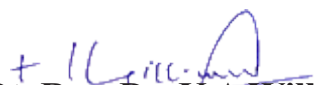

Activities of the year-2021-22 – at a Glance

Women Empowerment Program

89 new SHGs were formed and affiliated to the federations taking the total number of groups to 2969 with 48988 members. Mahilodaya Women's Federation and 27 taluk federations' elections were held for the period 2021-23. 30 domestic violence cases were tackled by SHG members and resolved.

CHILDLINE Projects

2013 cases were intervened, 289 child marriages were stopped, 47 missing children were repatriated, 92 school dropouts got re-enrolled, 12 child labour re-joined to school, 39 children were provided with shelter and 47 begging children were rescued.

Santhwana Kendra

112 cases were intervened and 70 cases were solved.

Capacity Building Program

694 trainings/ inputs/awareness, 45 staff trainings were conducted. 151130 members benefitted.

Sparsha cancer campaign

222 inputs/trainings, 13 health camps were organized. Monetary support was given to 169 cancer patients.

Alternative Renewable Energy

195 solar lanterns, house light system and street lights were repaired.

Good Governance

134 Grama Sabas, 9 Ward Sabas, 4 children Gramasabhas, 34 SDMC, 179 VHNSC, 14 Samanvaya meetings were conducted, 13229 members availed various Govt. schemes and facilities.

Natural Resource Management

In watershed areas 70% of the borewells got recharged and fetching good amount of water. 169 farmers have converted 347 acres of uncultivable land to cultivable land in the project areas.

Farmers Producers Organizations

4 FPCs and 1 Apex FPO have been initiated with 15,467 membership. 13534 small farmers affected by the CORONA were provided with food kits, seeds fertilizers, tarpaulins and monetary support.

GVSSMO-Men Farmers Federations

13 SHGs were newly formed during the year – thus presently there are 127 men farmers SHGs with 2209 members.

Sustainable Agriculture Project

619 soil and water tests were done in the lab at ODP and reports were provided to farmers with recommendations to improve their present situation.

PEEP

6031 SHG books, 2111 kgs of paper bags, 3246 litres Phenyl/dish wash, 268 face masks were sold, 10506 saplings raised and 2903 saplings were sold in Pragathi nursery.

Vaccination Project

38 camps were conducted, 1111 members were motivated and got vaccinated.

LEDP

450 women underwent and completed tailoring /embroidery trainings.

Family Development Program

188 very poor families were being supported under the project.

Academics

76 students had come to ODP and completed their field study / block placements.

Youth & Govt. schemes

188 members have approached ODP and collected details on various schemes available in the concerned department.

RCCE (Risk Communication and Community Engagement)

Awareness was given on COVID-19 Appropriate Behaviour (CAB) to 24,515 households.

Flood Support and Rehabilitation Project

20 house construction works and 10 retaining wall work have been completed – 11 houses in Hattihole and 9 houses Siddapura.

Rebuilding Vanachal Village

54 flood affected families supported with solar lights and 345 families with bee keeping boxes.

Flood Relief Project

Supported 80 poor, needy and flood affected families by setting up a Small Business Enterprise. 527 kgs of paper bags, 3418 cloth bags of various sizes were stitched and sold.

Awards

ODP has received award of appreciation from SRFS for highest loan linkage.

Celebrations

A number of celebrations such as World Environment Day, International Women's Day, Christmas & ODP day, Independence day, Girl Child day etc were celebrated.

COVID - 19 Support

An amount of Rs.1,90,81,400 is mobilized and supported 21772 COVID affected families.

1. WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM (WEP)- APRIL 2021 TO MARCH 2022

The Women Empowerment Program which was initiated in the year 1988-1989 is one of the earliest programs of ODP. From the inception, ODP has been able to organise, mobilize, empower, and build leadership in more than 50 thousand women from 2,969 women Self Help Groups (SHGs) in four districts of Karnataka. The women Self Help Groups are functioning actively under the umbrella of the 'Mahilodaya Mahila Okkuta', i.e. the Mahilodaya Women's Federation, formed by ODP in 1990-91.

The Mahilodaya Women's Federation has been supported and facilitated by ODP for the self-reliance of women and to uphold their dignity. It is a community-based institution, committed towards building leadership in women, enabling them to assert their rights and be active partners in development through local self-government systems.

5. Results of the meeting:

- * 341 SHG's have started giving receipts for the amount paid by the members.
- * Awareness was given to 1673 members on getting e-shrama card as a result 947 members have received the cards.
- * 1,196 members have participated in Mahila Grama Sabha and discussed about women reservation, MGNREGA, drinking water and construction of toilets.

6. Taluk and Mahilodaya Women's Federation Election:

- * 27 taluk federations' elections were held and elected new members. Office bearers were selected for the year 2021-2023.
- * 21 new members were elected for Maahilodaya Women's Federation for the period 2021-23. Mrs. Arockia Mary was elected as the President, Mrs. Rajamma as the Vice-President, Mrs. Meenakshi as Secretary, Mrs. Vimala- Joint-secretary and Mrs. Rekha as Treasurer. Governing board has 13 members and 28 members are in the general body.

7. Outcome of Sub-committees:

a. Education:

- * 474 groups are maintaining KYCs of the members and updating the SHG books on their own.
- * As per the norms of SHG, 821 SHGs have changed their representatives.
- * 786 new members have been enrolled in SHGs.
- * 213 members have withdrawn their membership due to old age.
- * 1037 members have emerged as leaders.
- * 133 groups were strengthened as a result, groups have started functioning.

c. Finance:

- * 1901 SHGs have paid the annual contribution.
- * 1625 SHGs have been audited and graded both socially and financially.
- * 1212 members are doing various income generation activities and have utilized an amount of Rs. 15,980,800/-.
- * 250 SHGs have received an amount of Rs. 10,38,70,000/- loan from MFIs and an amount of Rs. 14,80,80,192/- is repaid by the SHGs.
- * Vidya SHG, Virajpete received Rs, 1,00,000 for 10 members from minority department with Rs.20,000 subsidy.
- * 54 SHGs have lent their helping hand and have contributed an amount of Rs.74,073 towards health issues, medicines and funeral.

b. Health:

- * Awareness was given to the SHG members on COVID-19 safety measures- washing hands, using masks, maintaining social distance and on vaccination. As a result 55767 SHG members have taken COVID vaccine.
- * 4368 children and 1151 pregnant were immunized.
- * 5721 members have availed various health services from ASHA workers.
- * SHG members have identified 948 patients suffering from chronic diseases and were referred to local Govt. hospital.
- * SHG members contacted Lion's club members at Madikeri and mobilized mobile phone to CLHIV student at Madkeri.
- * One member from Aradhana SHG has received Rs. 5000/-amount from taluk panchayath towards the death of her husband who passed away due to COVID.

d. Environment:

- * SHG members have planted 7114 saplings (4169 horticulture and 2945 forestry), developed 170 kitchen/herbal gardens, 436 compost pits, 12 new ponds and 16 tank desilting works were done.
- * 121 SHG members participated in the “Savayava Krushi and Kula Govugala Sammelana” at Ankenahalli, which was organized by Agriculture Department.
- * Madikeri City Corporation had organized Shramadana under Swacha Bharath Mission, 113 SHG members along with Savitha Rakesh– Vice president of City Corporation / member of Kirthi SHG participated in the program.
- * 93 SHG members of Perambadi and Kallubane participated in the awareness program on compost making with kitchen waste. Mr. Rajan, PDO of Arjii Panchayath was the resource person.

8. Issues:

- * 33 domestic violence cases were identified, 30 cases have been solved by the SHG members through counselling with the family members. 3 cases were referred to the Free Legal Aid / police station.
- * 16 drunken husbands were identified and were referred to the de-addiction centre at Chamarajanagar, 12 members have recovered and are living happily with their family and 4 are undergoing treatment.
- * SHG members have made efforts and succeeded in stopping twelve child marriages.
- * Mysuru city corporation has issued water bill ranging from Rs. 30,000 to Rs. 1,00,000/- to the residents of Alanahalli. SHG members along with other people have taken up the issue and did lobbying with the corporation to rectify the water bill amount. As a result the amount has been reduced and new bill is given to the members.
- * Thavare CC members have noticed that few people are selling liquor illegally in the village, this issue was discussed in the meeting and the members have given a compliant to the President of Martalli Grama Panchayath to take action against it. As a result panchyath has taken action to stop selling liquor.
- * Deepika SHG members have stopped a child marriage at Chandakavadi, the girl who was a minor, was in love with a boy and both of them wanted to get marry. But the SHG members counselled them and were sent back to their parents.

9. SHG Anniversary:

Janani SHG – Polibetta, Taj Mahal SHG, Kallubane have celebrated 16 th & 17th anniversary, Soofi, Ave Maria and Shri Chamundeshwari SHGs – Mysuru have celebrated their 5th anniversary.

10. Case lets:

- * Mrs. Pushpa of Chennalinganahalli village was the member of Pushpanjali SHG. She was married to Mr. Mani who is a farmer. After some months both of them started quarrelling and her husband started harassing her. At one point Pushpa was unable to bear the torture, as a result she left the house and went back to her mother's house. This issue was taken up by the SHG members and later this was discussed in the federation meeting. Under the leadership of Mrs. Papannamma and other members, counselling was given to both the family members and advised Pushpa to come back home and assured their support. Pushpa was convinced and she came back and is staying with her husband. Now both of them are living happily.
- * Mrs. Nagamma is a member of Shri Chamundeshwari SHG & Mrs. Ganga member of Shri Ravaleshwara SHG was facing problems from their drunken husbands. Both of them have shared on the sufferings and problems undergone with the SHG meetings. Later this issue was taken to the federation and the leaders had discussions to solve the problem. The members had interaction with the husbands, the leaders contacted Dharmasthala Deaddiction center at Chamarajanagara and both were got admitted and treatment was given. After taking treatment for two months both men are living happily with their family members.
- * Moksharani is a member of Spoorthi SHG, Tamil slum colony, Maddur. Her daughter was in love with a boy from the same colony and eloped with the boy. Moksharani filed a complaint against the boy in the police station. But Mrs. Selvi – Ex-president of Mahilodaya Federation called both the families and advised to take back the compliant. Moksharani withdrawn the complaint. Both the families had negotiation and finally marriage took place in the police station.

11. Network Meetings:

ODP was invited by the Women and Child Development Department for a meeting to identify/ select children for state award. 15 children who have done outstanding performance in sports, cultural activities, music and innovative ideas were selected and submitted to the Department.

ODP represented in the meeting of Women and Child Development department-Kodagu in the complaint redressal committee- atrocity against women in working area at DC office.

ODP represented in the committee meeting of PC&PNDT (Pre Conception & Prenatal Diagnostic Technic Act) at DHO office Madikeri.

Staffs and SHG members participated in the meetings organized at DC offices at Mysuru and Madikeri and at NABARD-Kodagu. The main issues discussed were on Sakhi scheme, organizing birthdays of Dr. Ambedkar and Mr. Jagajeevan Rao and inviting ODP for District level meeting of Lead bank at Kodagu.

2. EMPOWERMENT OF SOCIO- ECONOMICALLY POOR AND DESTITUTE WOMEN IN KARNATAKA - SUPPORTED BY B. H. MISEREOR THROUGH KROSS, BANGALORE

The project aims at enabling women and their families claim their rights - related to health, education, income generation and political participation. The project also aims at prevention of atrocities / violence against women and legal interventions for the same. The project is implemented in 50 villages, and 3 taluks of Mysuru, Hunsur, K R Nagara and H D Kote taluks.

1. Meetings / Awareness / Strengthening of SHG / CCs

1108 SHGs, 142 Mahasangha meetings were conducted and members discussed on strengthening of CBOs, local contribution, formation of new groups, lobby and advocacy, FPO, free health check-up camps, trainings, SUF Loan Repayment, awareness on COVID-19 -using masks, maintaining social distance and use of sanitizer, Govt. schemes, etc.

Objective-1- Health & Environment:

25 trainings were conducted on herbal medicines, health and hygiene, right to food, communicable and non-communicable diseases, government schemes, nutritious food, global warming, climate change & renewable energy, rain water harvesting, kitchen garden, organic farming-waste management etc. 1042 women got benefitted.

Objectives-2 – Gender Sensitization, Women atrocities:

147 trainings were conducted on existing laws, dealing with conflict, providing advice / counselling and life skills, networking, lobbying & advocacy, strengthening of SHGs and CHILDLINE, conflict management, women reservations, women atrocities, and dowry prohibition Act. 610 SHG members participated in these trainings.

Objectives-3 – Good Governance, Mobilization of Govt. Schemes:

35 trainings were conducted on promoting leadership, skills of local leaders, existing laws, government facilities, local resource mobilization, right based approach, formation & strengthening of federations, RTI, PDS, FPO, documentation, MGNREGA, EAP/EDP. 1374 members participated in the training. PDO, Anganawadi workers, coordinators, managers were the resource persons.

2. Impacts:

- * 14 women atrocities cases were solved by the SHG members through counselling with the family members.
- * 115 members mobilized various government schemes (Housing, Ayushman Card, Toilets worth of Rs. 4,23,000).
- * 105 children and 5 women were immunized.
- * 16 visits were made by the SHG members to various departments for networking, lobbying & advocacy.
- * 70 members gained knowledge on environment and RTE.
- * 231 members have planted 626 saplings in the kitchen and herbal garden - curry leaf, brinjal, ladies finger, beans, coriander, lemon, hibiscus, guava, etc.

3.SANTHWANA KENDRA - SOMWARPET

The Santhwana Kendra has been promoted to ensure women from the marginalized sections of society were protected against abuse and exploitation. The activities of the Kendra have been formulated to guarantee the basic human rights of women, which include – care, protection and rehabilitation. This project is supported by the Women and Child Welfare Department, Govt. of Karnataka, in Kudige village of Somwarpet Taluk, Kodagu District.

3.Awareness programs:

316 awareness programs were conducted on Santhwana Kendra and its services - to SHG members, CDPO office staff, Anganwadi teachers and general public at Somwarpet, Chowdlu, Kakkehole, Bajjegundi, Balagundah etc. 3669 members got benefitted.

4.Department Visits:

9 visits were made to Deputy Director of Women and Child Welfare Department, CDPO office, Taluk Office and Police stations towards cases follow-up, report submission, meetings.

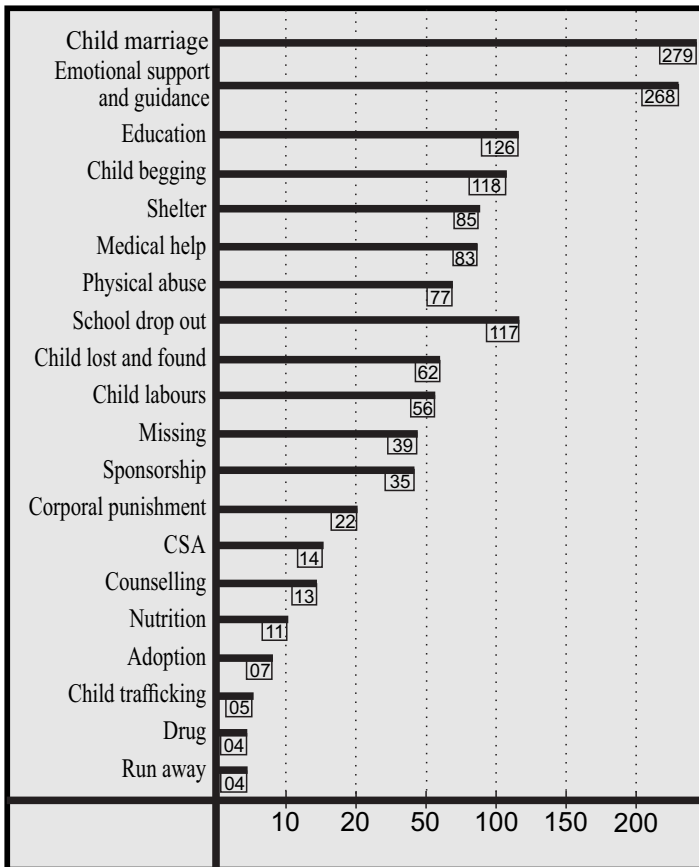
4. CHILDLINE – NODAL ORGANIZATION - MYSURU

CHILDLINE is a project of the Ministry of Women and Child Development and Child India Foundation works in partnership with NGOs, Govt. departments, corporate sector institutions, etc. ODP has taken up this project in Mysuru as Nodal organization and in Chamarajanagara as the Collab centre. The services provided by CHILDLINE are counseling, crisis intervention, temporary shelter, home placement and institutional placement.

1. Call details & Case Interventions:

2. Impacts:

- * 210 child marriages were stopped with the help of DCPO, CDPO, PSI and Supervisors. All the cases were produced before CWC. 6 married girls were rescued and were admitted to Bapuji children's home.
- * 43 missing children were found and they were repatriated, 58 school dropouts were re-enrolled to schools, 12 child labors, 4 runaway children and 47 begging children were rescued and they were asked to go to school regularly.
- * 5 children who were abused sexually were rescued and have been rehabilitated to girls home and FIR is filed against the abusers.
- * 25 children were provided with shelter at Govt. boys home, 7 sponsorship cases were referred to DCPU and health department.

3. Meetings:

Monthly, weekly, half yearly and annual meetings were conducted with different partners and discussed on cases, CSD week, TAB meetings, resource directory, creating volunteers, strengthening the Makkala Kavalu Samithi, child marriage survey, yearly magazine, coordination and convergence meetings, follow-ups, challenges, action plans etc. Ms. Chithra Anchan and Mr. Vaibhav from CIF, reviewed the work performance and suggestions were given to all the coordinator.



4. Coordination and convergence meeting:

Coordination and convergence meeting was held on 20/9/2021 at DD of WCD office, Mysuru and chaired by Mrs. Gita Lakshmi- DD of WCD, district child protection officers, CDPO's, SJPU members, hostel superintendents, DCPU staff and CHILDLINE members took part in the meeting. Major issues discussed are follow up of child marriage SOP, awareness creating, to provide sponsorship from DCPU and rescue child labors and begging children.

Four TAB meetings were conducted at Mysuru, Nanjangud, Periyapatana and T.N Pura taluks. Respective Tasildhars chaired the meetings. Main issues discussed were on child marriage rescues, wall paintings, trainings, taluk level WhatsApp group, case details etc.

5. Beggars and Street Children Rescue Operation:

This activity was carried out across the city in a joint operation with the DCPU, CHILDLINE, SJPU, and Anti-Human- Trafficking Unit (AHTU). 25 children and 15 women were begging on the streets of the city were rescued. Five boys and five girls rescued children were sent to a Govt. – run boys and girl's home respectively. Women and their children were sent to Stree Seva Nikethan run by WCD. These children were sent to rehabilitation after producing them before CWC.

6. CHILDLINE Se Dosti Program: (CSD Week)

A week-long awareness programs were conducted in coordination with departments to generate awareness among public about CHILDLINE. The program was inaugurated by Ms. Najiya Sulthan - Asst. Labor Commissioner and Mr. Ramachandre Raje Urs - DDPI, by waving off the flag and releasing CSD posters. Various awareness programs such as physical consultation program, radio program, sensitization, online safety, debate, drawing competitions were organized. Officers from various departments took part in the program. 1145 students and people took part in the programs and awareness has reached to more than 1000 people.

7. Workshop:

In collaboration with labour department, workshop was organized to Section-17 officers on Child labour Act. The program was inaugurated by Mr. Prathap Shima, MP, Mysore and Kodagu. Totally 357 officers participated in the program.

8. Networking visits.

66 networking visits were made to – DC office, DD of WCD, Child Welfare Committee, Tashildhar, EO, District Child Protection Unit, Labour office, Education, DLSA, CDPO, DDPI, BEO and SJPU. Issues discussed were on training program, CAB meeting, child marriage cases, report submission, coordination meeting, rescue operations, monitoring visit, CHILD Se Dosthi program, program planning, reports, etc.

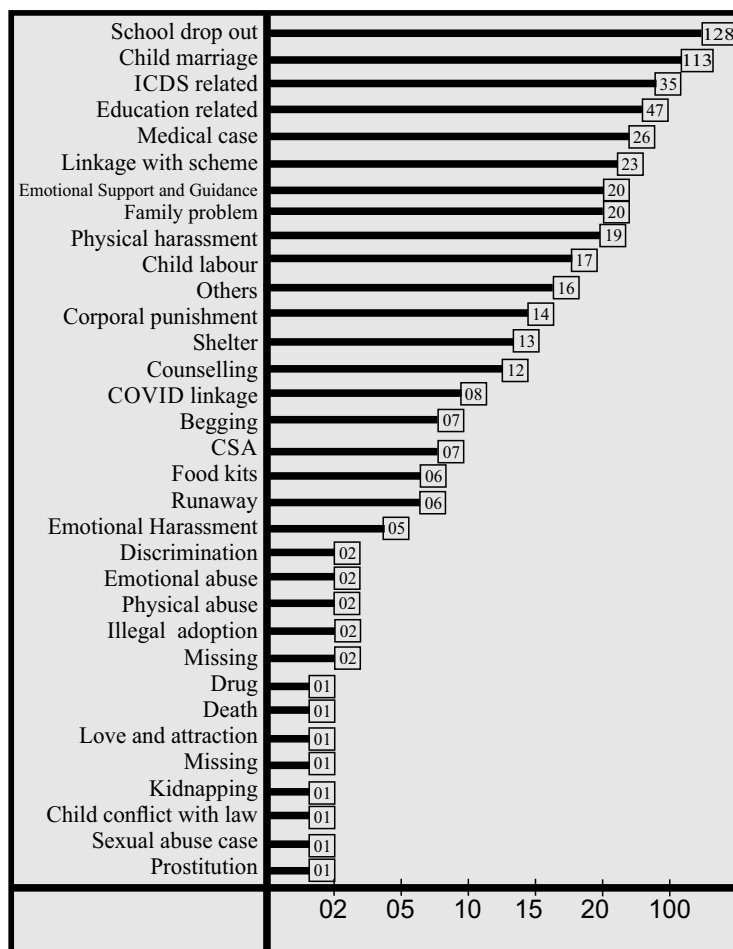

2. Impacts:

- * 79 child marriages were stopped with the support of Women and Child Dept., Zilla Panchyath, Police, health officials. 6 married cases were referred to CMPO's.
- * 34 school dropouts were given counselling and rejoined them to the schools.
- * 12 child labour identified, three of them were sent back home and two got re-joined to school.
- * 7 sexual abuse cases - FIR filed under POCSO Act.
- * 18 sponsorship & runaway cases were referred to CWC, DCPU, SJPU and PDOs.
- * 9 children were admitted to shelter homes through CWC.
- * 16 family problems cases were solved and counselling was given to the parents.

3. CHILDLINE Se Dosti Program: (CSD Week):

A week-long awareness programs were conducted in coordination with departments to generate awareness among public about Child Rights, Child Labor, Physical Abuse, Sexual Abuse, Child Marriage, Government Facilities for Children etc. Various awareness programs Announcement at Railway Station, Walkathon: Samvadha Karyakrama, awareness on "Sensitive towards child protection and their rights" road safety, health check-up for special children, open houses, Speech and Drawing Competition. Awareness has reached to more than 3,475 people.

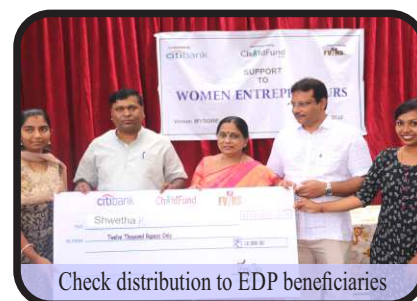

7. SPARSHA CANCER CAMPAIGN

This project will endeavour to spread awareness on the various aspects of cancer – so that people know about the symptoms, risks and treatment of cancer, and are able to cope with it adequately. A society that mitigates the threat of the deadly disease 'cancer' through awareness, early detection, treatment and prevents it by adopting healthy lifestyles.

- * 177 inputs, 45 mass awareness programs were conducted on cancer, types, precautionary measures, self-examination, treatment, facilities from the Govt, Institutional palliative care services, healthy food habits, usage of medicinal plants, kitchen garden, breast cancer, mammography etc. Handbills were distributed to all the participants. 9216 SHG members, farmers, youths, community people, cancer patient's family members, staff etc. got benefitted.
- * 169 cancer patients were provided with Rs.3000-Rs.5000/- cash and nutrition food – cereals, grams, millets, Horlicks etc. worth of Rs. 1500.
- * 13 Free Health check-up camps were conducted in collaboration with St. Joseph's Hospital, DRM Hospital, Mysuru Doctor's team and technicians from PHCs. 1449 members got benefitted. Tests were conducted for BP/ Diabetes/HB/ECG /Saturation level etc. Free medicines were provided for common diseases, cancer screening was done for women above 45 years.
- * On the occasion of International Women's Day program, hair donation campaign was organized, 24 members donated 1500 grams of hair towards cancer patients. All these donors were given certificates as a token of appreciation.

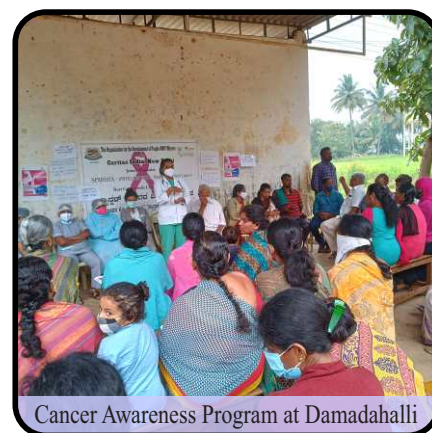

8. GOOD GOVERNANCE PROGRAM

The program aims to strengthen elected women representatives (EWRs) in panchayats and enable them towards action for good governance – through developing their knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence in Chamarajanagara, Mysuru, Kodagu and Mandya Districts.

134 Grama Sabas, 9 Ward Sabas, 4 Children Gramasabhas, 34 SDMC, 179 VHNSC, 14 Samanvaya were conducted in the working areas and discussed on MGNREGA, housing, sanitation, sunken pits, safe drinking water, nutrition food, sanitation to schools, e-swathu, Rastriya Poshan Abhiyana, job cards, house documents, etc. 1886 SHG representatives and 158 school children participated in the Gramasabhas.

1. Networking:

910 SHG/CC members visited line departments / gramapanchayaths, anganawadis and schools and had discussions with the officials on, nonpayment of labor charges, job cards, seeds distribution, trainings, sanitation, MGNREGA, manure, agriculture implements, coconut saplings, cleanliness, maintenance, food distribution, plantation, pension subsidy loans etc. 36 memorandums were submitted to various officers to solve the problems immediately.

9. NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT - NRM

To enable small and marginal farmers to adopt improved cropping patterns and sustainable agricultural practices for drought proofing to result in better crop yields in dry and arid areas, watershed project have been implemented. Implementation of these projects has resulted in increase in productivity in the agriculture sector. Water availability has also increased in the lean season for irrigation and domestic purpose. More job opportunities have also been created.

1. Watershed Impacts:

- * Rain water is harvested in the ponds, gabion dams, RRS, nalabund, check dams have percolated into the ground and helped in recharge of ground water. Water collected is used by the cattle's for drinking and also for the domestic purpose.
- * 70% of the bore wells got recharged and fetching good amount of water in the project areas; as a result drinking water is regularly supplied to the villages. With good water availability farmers have started cultivating different crops- turmeric, onion, vegetables and banana.
- * 58 farmers have dug individual bore wells in the watershed areas, 2 to 3" inch of water got stuck to a depth of 400-450 feet. With sufficient water availability the farmers have planted horticulture saplings – 1620 sapota, 3380 mango 2640 coconut plants, and 28 farmers have started cultivating mulberry.
- * 169 farmers have converted 347 acres of uncultivable land to cultivable land and have grown maize crop. The farmers have grown an average of 9000 quintals of maize and sold it for Rs. 1900/- per quintal. 32 farmers have adopted drip irrigation and managing the water.

An apex level farmer's federation was initiated and got registered under Karnataka Society Registration Act. It is formed to empower local communities, to manage resources for their own development in a sustainable and responsible manner.

2. Meetings:

1254 groups meetings, 98 inputs, 9 trainings were held and inputs given on formation of men groups, FPO activities, kitchen garden, leadership, Govt. facilities, casting vote, COVID-19-social distancing, health and hygiene, corona support; vaccination, exposure visits, distribution of fertilizer, e-shram and Job cards, etc. 1928 members attended and got benefitted.

3. Results:

- * 134 SHG members attended Gramasabha, social auditing and discussed on housing, drainage, desilting of ponds, lying of drinking water pipeline and Anganawadi problems.
- * 413 SHG members worked under MGNREGA and got wages at Rs.284/- each for 8 days.
- * 24 members got their eye tested in the free eye check-up camps, 6 SHG members have donated blood during blood donation camp.
- * Veterinary health camp was organized by milk dairy society at Maddur, 370 cows and goats were treated.
- * 18 SHGs were strengthened and the groups have started functioning.
- * 42 members joined the existing groups, 36 SHGs have changed their representatives as per the norms of SHG.

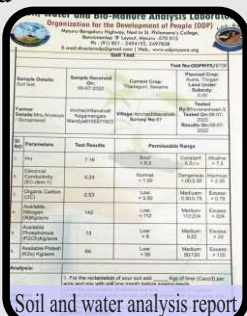

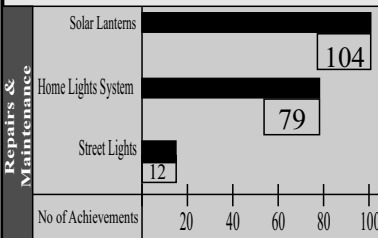

13. FARMERS PRODUCERS ORGANIZATION / COMPANY (FPO/ FPC)

Farmer Producer Organisations (FPOs) have been thought of and formed-for improved productivity, collective marketing and direct linkages to the market system - so as to eliminate middlemen and money lenders and get a better pricing to the farmers for their produce. 36 FPOs were formed and 15467 farmers have been enrolled.

a. Bhusiri Development Foundation (BDF)

1.Meetings:

- * 336 FPC committee meetings were held to discuss on buyer seller meet, tarpaulins, fertilizers, value addition, responsibility sharing, model farmers, Suggi Sambrama, enrolment of new members, reorganize committee, trainings, roles and responsibility of leaders, soil and water testing, membership, collecting KYCs, model plot, concept of FPO, mass awareness, exposures, model farmers, COVID -19 relief support, etc. 12 review / team meetings were organized with the field staff to review the progress of the project. Discussions were held on status of membership, COVID-19 relief to farmers, kitchen garden, and distribution of fertilizers, seeds, food /grain kits, case studies, trainings / exposures, future planning, reporting, challenges faced in the field, etc.
- * BDF advisory and BDF expert committee meeting was held and discussed on collective farming, and collective marketing, crops for value addition, pricing and marketing of crops. The meeting was a confidence building forum for the farmers as they were able to meet representatives, interact with each other, share and learn from each other's experiences and making progress in a collective manner. 73 farmers participated in the program.
- * 83 buyers and sellers meetings were held to establish linkage directly with the farmers and the buyers/ suppliers. The farmers were made aware on the products which are in demand so that they can plan and diverse their cropping pattern accordingly. 8769 farmers participated in the meetings. Personals from Syngenta and Vestige companies, Bangalore participated in the meetings.

2. Mass Awareness and Rapport Building Meetings:

104 mass awareness, 107 rapport building meetings were held and the farmers were provided with awareness about the project activities planned, concept of FPOs, membership, Suggi Sambrama, facilities available in Sericulture, Horticulture Depts. soil and water analysis, input & output marketing, value added activities, medicinal plants, organic farming, nutrition food, precautionary measures during chemicals spray, input and output marketing, criteria for selection of model plot farmers, grant for COVID patients etc.

Agriculture Department, RSKs, bank officials, local health workers, other NGOs representatives, local people, village elders, SHG members, farmers, and youths were in the program. Government officials gave inputs of the schemes and facilities available in the department. Around 18386 members got benefitted from the program.

3. Inputs / Trainings

- * 95 inputs sessions were given by the coordinators and animators to the members on concept of FPO, membership, soil & water test, project activities, kitchen garden etc. in all the clusters. 4321 members got benefitted.
- * 322 trainings to women, and 54 Agri related trainings were conducted in the project areas. The topics covered are - leadership, value addition, processing of millets, marketing system, collective farming, licenses, mushroom cultivation, nutrient management in vegetable crops, new cropping method in vegetable, organic farming, women office bearers in FPO committee etc. 13,408 members participated in the training program and got benefitted.

4. Exposures visits to FPO leaders and members: 24 exposure visits were organized; 1,006 farmers participated and visited the following agencies and institutions.

5. Impacts:

- * Farmers gained knowledge on importance of FPOs, advantages of collective procuring and marketing of agricultural produces.
- * Govt. officials such as agriculture, horticulture, RSK and Gramapanchayats are inviting ODP staff to plan for collaborative trainings, farmers are selected for demonstrations and new variety of gram seeds to the farmers.
- * Active women members are selected as vice-president, secretary and treasurer in the FPO committee.
- * A good environment is created in the village about ODP and its activities, farmers have gained confidence on ODP and coming forward to take membership in the FPOs.
- * In some clusters FPO members are taking initiatives to enrol farmers in the FPOs, involve in distribution of fertilizers, food kits, tarpaulins etc.
- * Farmers are expressing their happiness for creating an opportunity to meet various Govt. officials in their villages.
- * The agencies are selling tarpaulins to the FPO members to the supply rate. (Market price is higher than the supply price). The quality of the materials is also found to be good, seeing this non FPO members have started contacting the FPO committee members and expressing their willingness to take up the membership in the FPOs.
- * Mr. Paramesh, Konanuru village of Nagamangala Taluk has received 'Taluk level Yuva Raitha' during "Krishi Mela" which was organised by the University of Agricultural Sciences-Bengaluru.
- * 8 farmers mobilized pipes / cattle medicines from RSK & Animal Husbandry department worth of Rs. 21,150/-

8. Soil Testing & Analysis:

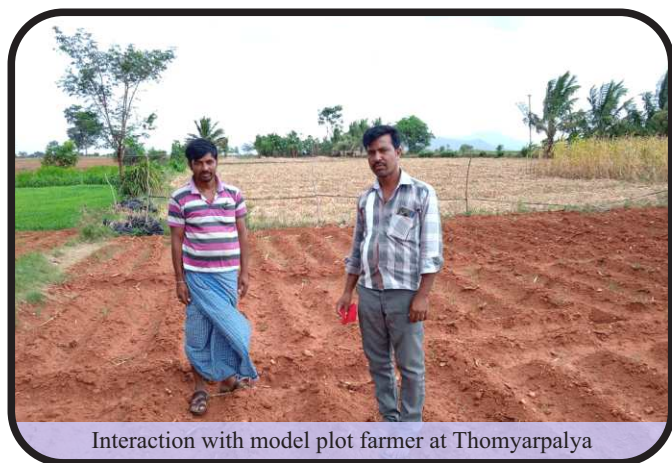
313 soil and water tests have been done by the farmers. Recommendations were given to the farmers on moisture content, nutrients deficiency etc., to improve the soil fertility.

10. Others:

14. LIVELIHOOD ENHANCEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (LEDP)

ODP has given a lot of importance for sustainable development of poor and marginalized families through viable and need based Income Generation Program's. The program aims at creating opportunities, enhancing skills and facilitating, enabling environment that empower associated communities to explore more possibilities for better income generation that would sustain and support their households.

1. Trainings:

- * 24 EDP trainings were conducted for 450 beneficiaries at Mysuru, Mandya, Kodagu and Chamarajanagara. Resource persons were from Cooperative Bank Self Employment Training Institute (COBSETI) and Vijaya Bank Self Employment Training Institute (VBSETI). Inputs were given on use of media for marketing and sales, leadership, personality development, upgradation of skills etc.
- * 9 financial literacy and 6 refresher trainings were conducted and inputs were given to the beneficiaries on zero account opening, PAN card, bank linkage, qualities of entrepreneur, upgradation of skills, fashion designing and ornaments makings etc. Resource persons were from State Bank of India and RUDESET. 200 members participated in the training.
- * 6 trainings were organized on artificial ornament making/ cotton bags / mask stitching at Erasavadi, Agara and Thimmarajapura villages. 90 members have undergone the trainings.
- * After the Course Completion, Certificates were distributed to 450 beneficiaries who have completed the trainings.
- * 207 women have purchased new machines, 59 have joined garments, and 326 members have started their own business. 56 members have started doing embroidery, and zari works and earning additional income.
- * Tailoring demo unit is started at Kamagere and Madikeri with 10 members.

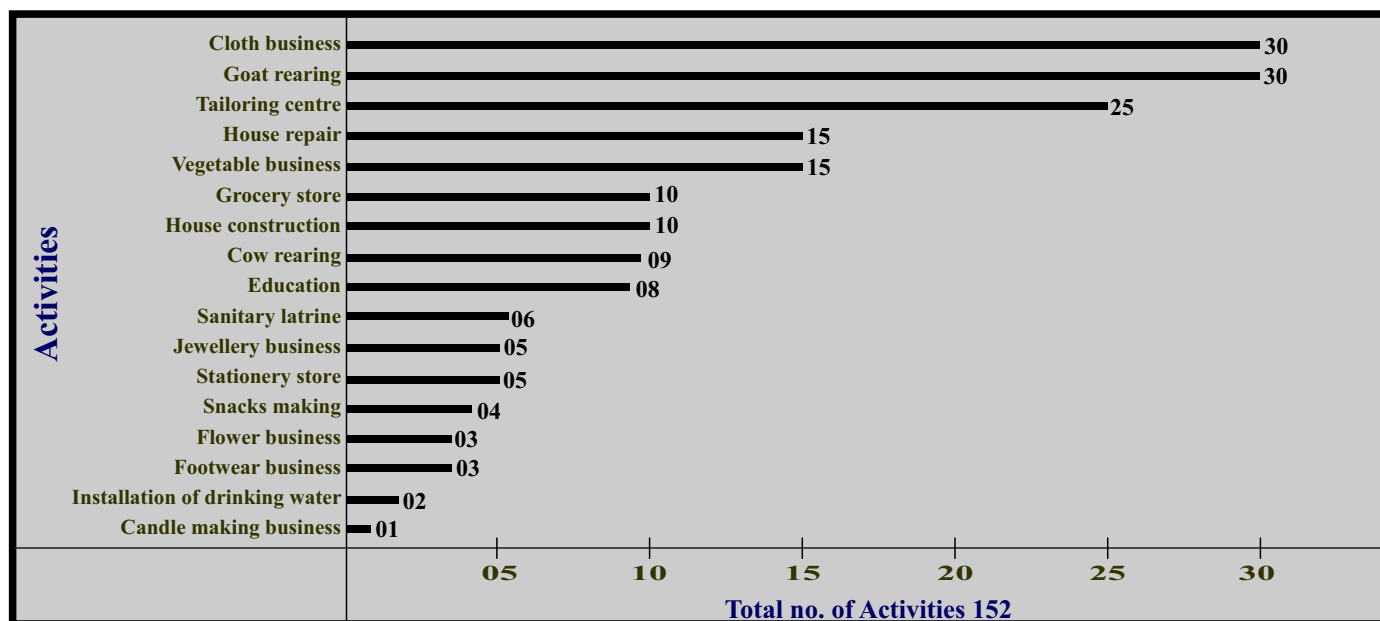
- * 188 families are active and 82 families are graduated.

2. Trainings/ Inputs:

6 trainings and 278 inputs were given to the leaders and staff on SHG grading, book keeping, environment, human rights, strengthening of federation, financial literacy, government facilities, labour insurance, beautician, World AIDS Day, leadership, conflict management, COVID-19 vaccination, Sparsha-Cancer awareness. 4314 SHG members were benefitted.

20. RISK COMMUNICATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT(RCCE)

The goal of the program is to reduce the spread of COVID cases and COVID affected death. The objective is to mitigate the health impact of COVID Appropriate Behaviour (CAB) and preventing the spread of COVID-19. The main focus of the program is CAB, early testing and treatment, initiation, identifying, warning symptoms, vaccination and Post COVID care.

49 Caritas Samaritans (CS) visited 24,515 households and awareness given on COVID-19 Appropriate Behaviour (CAB), myths and misconceptions, stigma related to COVID, timely testing and treatment seeking, home isolation, vaccination, service information sharing etc. and 10,846 audio visuals were sent to households. 13 state level review meeting were conducted online.

Information Support Centre (ISC)

Caritas India has sanctioned one-month project called Information Support Center (ISC) -COVID-19 respond. In this project, awareness was given to members on safety measures, hygiene and vaccination to 2000 households. Help desks were set up at Mysore and Kodagu and awareness was given to general public.

21. VACCINATION PROJECT

A large number of people believe vaccination could be life threatening and have lot of myths and misconceptions. The project aims at tackling these issues, create awareness among the community and achieve 100% vaccination. With the support of Azim Premji Foundation, 12 PHCs were selected covering 155 villages and 8 wards with 65,404 households at Mysuru and Hanur Taluks.

1. Meetings:

- * 3 meetings were held with the District Health Officer, Mysuru and Taluk Health Officers – Hanur and Ramapura and discussed on ODP collaborating with the PHCs and support in vaccination drive.
- * 14 meetings were held with the staff and discussed on camps, survey, updating details in VaxIT, action plan, coordination with PHCs etc. 70 staff participated in these meetings.

2. Baseline Survey and Vaccination:

75% survey is completed in all the areas, 38 camps were conducted, 1111 members were motivated and got vaccinated from the identified areas .

3. Induction Training:

The training was organized to the coordinators on 18th January 2022 at ODP campus on Corona virus origin, symptoms, vaccine, challenges, etc. After the training coordinators collected masks and sanitizer to all the vaccine team members. Totally 15 members were in the training.

4. Launching Program:

Launching of vaccine drive was organized on 14.01.022 at Anganawadi Kendra, K.N.Pura. The program was inaugurated by lighting the lamp and it was officially launched by giving jabs to the people. Dr. Maheswarappa addressed and said on the importance of taking vaccine, challenges and role of GOs and NGOs to make vaccine project a successful. Fr. Alex Prashanth Sequeira addressed the gathering and said we all must work together for a healthy society.

5. Visit:

Ms. Aakriti – Program Manager, Azim Premji Foundation visited Hanur and Martalli Zone on 23rd Feb 2022, and had interaction with the PHC and project staff on the work progress. She visited the vaccination camp which was organized at Doddane village, Martalli.

32.CASE STUDIES

Case Study - 1 : The world needs strong women.

Jayalakshmi W/o Shekar is a member of Shubodaya SHG of Bhuthana Hosuru village of Mandya District. She was a very shy natured woman, and less exposed to the outer world. She has studied up to 10th class and later she got married. Jayalakshmi is living with her husband and two children. She was always accompanied by her husband or someone whenever she was going outside the village.

One day her friend Shridevi motivated her to join the self-help group which was formed by ODP. Jayalakshmi expressed her willingness to join the SHG in which her friend had taken the membership. But unfortunately that group had 20 members therefore she could not join the group. Later a new SHG which is named as Shubodaya was formed in the village and she got enrolled in that group, luckily she was selected as the representative of the group.

Jayalakshmi started participating in the group activities actively; she attended various trainings on leadership, book writing, women atrocity, IGP etc. Slowly she took courage and started visiting bank to deposit the amount collected in the group. She also started visiting various government offices with the SHG members.

The SHG members recognized the leadership quality of Jayalakshmi and selected her as the member to the taluk federation. After attending the meetings at the taluk level she started gaining knowledge and courage on different arenas. She contested in the milk dairy elections and she got elected. Later she was selected as the President of the milk dairy. During her tenure she made lot of improvements, computer was purchased and put in place, for safety purposes CC cameras and Siren to the milk dairy office were installed. On the occasion of Ayuda Pooja she announced bonus to the employees along with gifts.

Jayalakshmi remembered her days and said that she had never dreamt that she will be so strong and could become president of the milk dairy. All this has happened only because of the knowledge which she gained in the trainings conducted by ODP. She appreciates the efforts made by ODP towards empowering women and making them as leaders. Jayalakshmi expressed that she and her family members are very grateful to ODP for empowering her and helping her to lead a decent life.

Case Study - 2 : School is a building which has four walls with tomorrow inside.

Pruthvi is a 14 year old boy hailing from Nalluru village; he was a school dropout, he is living with his parents and two sisters. His father works as a daily labour and mother is a house wife. Prithvi was the only son in the family; therefore all the family members were looking after him with love, care and affection. Lots of freedom was given to Pruthvi, he was pampered and nobody was stopping him from doing anything. Due to this, the child became very naughty, arrogant not listening to any one including his parents. He had stopped going to school during the lockdown period and he never returned to school after reopening. The boy got addicted to mobile phone; he was always spending time playing and roaming around villages.

The Anganawadi teacher noticed the boy and she wanted to send him back to school. In this situation the Anganawadi teacher happens to meet the coordinator of CHILDLINE-1098,Chamarajanagar and explained the situation of Pruthivi a school dropout.



Child line intervention: Child line team took up the issue and visited the boy's house. During their visit the members noticed that the child was busy playing with his phone. The team had interaction with the family members, the family members expressed that, they have advised and tried several times to send him to school, but everything has gone in vain. He was becoming more furious and behaved very arrogantly with the family members on going to school. Finally the family members lost hope and let him go as he wished. After this the CHILDLINE team met the boy separately, counseled the boy and motivated him to go to school. The boy promised that he will go to school from next day.

On the next day, the team followed up with the family members and came to know that he did not go to the school. The team talked to his father and asked him to send the boy to the school, the father said that he will take his son and drop him to school on the next day.

Since the boy was not willing to go to school, his father decided to take the boy with him to work in the field. The team members visited the boy's house on the next day and they saw that the child was not sent to school rather he was working in the field with his father. The team met the father and counseled him, made him to understand on the consequences to be faced with the child labour and asked to send his son to the school.

The team made continuous follow up but still the boy was not sent to school. Finally the team visited the village along with police personals and warned the family members on sending the boy to the school. Finally the boy was sent back to school. The team visited this family frequently and ensured that the child is going to the school. Also the team called up the Head master of the school and confirmed that the child is coming to school.

Child line team members have made multiple visits, gave counseling and succeeded in changing an arrogant and totally disoriented child and put him back to school. The boy is going to school regularly and staying happily with his parents and sisters.

Case Study - 3 : Waste isn't waste until we waste it.

Mrs. Nethravathi lives with her husband, mother-in-law and her two children. The family is having one acre of land in which she was growing mulberry and ragi. Two cows and a calf are kept by the family for additional income.

Cooking was done using firewood; every day around 5kgs of firewood was used for cooking purpose. She was spending time to go to the shop to purchase fire wood and carry it on her head up to her home. The family had LPG connection but it was used only during emergencies, due to increased rate of cost.

ODP staff had given orientation on the construction of bio gas and its advantages. Finally 2 cubic meter biogas plant was constructed. Good amount of gas is produced from the plant which is sufficient to cook food for 5 members every day. Nethravathi is very happy and has expressed that she is saving money and time after construction of biogas and from the past 6 months she has not purchased LPG cylinder. At the same time she has stopped cutting trees for firewood and saved the trees.



With the use of clean energy, the kitchen has become a smoke free kitchen. Agriculture being the main occupation of the family, the slurry which comes out of the gas plant is used as manure. Since the dung is managed well, a healthy environment is created for a healthy life. The family is saving an average amount of Rs. 1175/- per month. Saving of wood has reduced cutting of trees. Mrs. Nethravathi along with her family members expressed thanks to ODP and Zillapanchayath- Mysuru for the support.



Case Study - 4 : Where there is progress there is change.

Family Background: Mr. Paramesh. K.B. is coming from an agrarian background and a native of Konanuru village of Nagamangala Taluk. He is 25 year old and he is living with his father Mr. Balashankara KS, mother Mrs. Indira and Mr. Hemnath Kumara, younger brother. His father owned 10 acres of land in which he was practicing traditional agriculture and growing only Paddy and Ragi.

When Paramesh was doing his 2nd PUC, his father met with an accident and lost his leg. When the main bread winner has lost his leg, the family members were worried on their survival. This is the moment where Paramesh left his studies and took up the responsibility of the family and continued doing agriculture as his father was doing.



ODP-Intervention: The staff of ODP, made house visits and motivating farmers on the benefits of FPO, and organizing farmers in the Farmers Producers Organizations. Understanding the benefits of FPO, Mr. Paramesh got motivated and took membership in the FPO. After taking membership, he underwent several trainings on integrated farming system, organic farming, and new cropping system on onion. He took part in the exposures visits and learnt on new ventures in agriculture. Acquiring the knowledge, he was inspired to take up new cropping system and initially he tried to grow apple, water apple, and Dragan fruit, cherry in 0.5

acre land. He has also started growing cover crops to conserve soil and water.

As part of the FPO activity, Mr. Paramesh was a model farmer, where he planned to grow onion crop. He had purchased onion seeds - Arka Ujwal variety from IIHR, Hesaragatta, Bangaluru. He has followed all the instructions given and had grown 15 quintals of onion in 10 guntas of land using organic method of cultivation. The neighbouring farmers have visited the farm and was impressed with the crop, they were collecting details on the cultivation method that he has adopted.



With the results gained from the model plot, ODP staff motivated and supported Mr. Paramesh to apply for 'Taluk level Yuva Raitha Award'. As a result Mr. Paramesh was selected for the award. On the occasion of "Krishi Mela" which was organised by the University of Agricultural Sciences-Bengaluru, was awarded with the award by the dignitaries. Mr. Paramesh was very excited and was very proud to receive the award.



He has expressed that the strength behind him to reach this level is ODP, it is only because of taking membership in FPO, and he got a chance to enhance his knowledge through various trainings, exposures. He also said he has gained self-confidence to try out new methods of cultivation. He whole heartedly conveyed his thanks to Andheri Hilfe and ODP for all the support given to him and moulding him to be as a model farmer.

Case Study - 5 : Secret of going ahead is getting started.

Mr. Manjunath belongs to Sonahalli village H.D. Kote Taluk, Mysore District. He is 36 years old; he is living with his wife Shoba and two children – Diksha – 4 years and Darshith – 1 year old. He has studied upto 9th standard and doing agriculture for the past 15 years. He has 2 acres of land where he was growing some vegetables and ragi. He was investing more money for cultivation but he was getting very low income. He was applying lot of chemical



fertilizers for his crops to get good yield but he was not getting the expected production. .

With the motivation of ODP staff, he got enrolled in the FPO. He participated in the trainings, inputs, exposures. He acquired knowledge on low cost technology, effects of chemical fertilizers, use of organic manure etc. He started doing integrated agricultural activities and started cultivating coconut, mango, banana and vegetables like tomato and chilly using organic method of

cultivation. He is now using more organic manures like farm yard manure (FYM), vermicomposting, neem cake, panchagavya and other organic manures. He has started getting good yield.

For the last 2 years he was not able to sell his products that he has grown due to series of lockdowns. But now he has earned a good amount of money through the sale of tomatoes and chillies. In addition to this; he has 6 milching cows, small poultry, goats which is fetching him additional income.

Mr. Manjunath was selected and was nominated to receive the 'Star Raitha' award which was announced by Vijaya Karnataka Newspaper, for the model farmers at Hunsur. The farmer was very happy for the recommendation of his name for the award.

The farmer has expressed that, he could do this is only because of the knowledge received through the trainings conducted by ODP. He has expressed his happiness and conveyed his thanks to the donors - Andheri Hilfe and ODP for their support at the time of crisis. He is also encouraging other farmers to take membership in the FPO.

“Organic farming and other earlier methods can be effective, provided they can help us improve Soil health and Plant health.” – M. S. Swaminathan

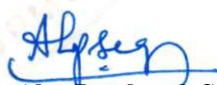
